Sociology 820: Seminar in Marriage and Family

Description: This graduate seminar introduces students to a wide range of studies in the sociology of family, improving their ability to critically analyze work in this field and inspiring students' own family-related research. The course materials draw on a variety of theoretical, historical, cultural and methodological perspectives to examine topics such as union formation and dissolution, family relationships, childbearing, parenthood, work and family issues, and intergenerational exchanges.

Requirements: Your performance in this seminar will be based on three criteria: class participation, weekly reading memos, and a final research paper/proposal.

- 1. <u>Class Participation</u>: You are expected to attend every class and be prepared to participate in class discussion of the readings. Each student will volunteer to lead discussion for one seminar session.
- 2. Reading Memos: Each week (starting with the second week) you will prepare a two page memo that discusses the main themes or questioned raised by the readings for the week. You will post these memos to your Dropbox in Sakai by 7pm every Sunday. Use this opportunity to intellectually engage with the readings, synthesize the ideas, critique the state of the field, and/or propose new applications of the ideas. I will read the memos each week, use them to guide class discussion, and occasionally send you comments on your ideas.

3. <u>Research Paper/Proposal</u>: The major assignment of this class is to write a research paper/proposal on a family topic. We will work through the paper process together as a class using the following deadlines:

Grading: Final grades will be equally based on a student's class participation and contributions, weekly synthesis notes, and a final research paper/proposal. A grade of "P" signifies having met all course requirements and showing mastery of the topics covered. A grade of "H" is reserved for those students who excel at all three requirements of this seminar (often only a couple of students in class achieve this grade, but it can vary). Those who consistently perform less than satisfactorily in one or more of the aspects of this course will receive Ls (rare, but possible), and those who give little to no effort will receive Fs (even more rare, but also possible).
